# Committee's Comments & Recommendations

## • Educational campaigns, classes, or programs

At least three members of the Committee expressed a desire to see educational campaigns, classes, or programs, including on the following topics:

- Biking and pedestrian safety
  - Lights and reflectors
  - Proper bike fit
  - Biking Safety 101
  - Pedestrian safety 101
- o Biker & Pedestrian Safety for Motorized Vehicle Drivers
  - Stopping at crosswalks
  - Speeding
- How to Enjoy Outdoor Activities

#### Wayfinding signage to increase awareness of City's trails

Several members of the Committee emphasized the need for more awareness of the City's trail assets using high-visibility signage around the City to indicate location and distance of trails. Particular emphasis was made for the trail behind the library and the Westside Blueway Trails.

NOTE: Urban Health Partnerships completed a Wayfinding Signage Plan for Live Healthy Miami Gardens in 2019 that included an analysis based on locational criteria and on-site feasibility analysis to determine proposed locations, renderings of the signage designs, vendor information, and GIS mapping of the proposed locations. ## Bike racks/parking

Members expressed difficulty finding places to park their bike when on biking trips within the City. A member mentioned Wal-mart and Starbucks as specific locations where bike parking is needed

## Community biking events

Several Committee members expressed a desire for more community bike events and rides. A monthly bike ride was suggested. A Miami Lakes night ride was provided as an example wherein the City had the police present and used neon lighting to guide the biking group.

Members felt it was important to hold these events as a safer means to getting the City's drivers used to having bikers in the streets, and to encouraging more bikers and pedestrians and increasing eyes on the streets.

## • Visibility on paths and trails

A few Committee members voiced concern about insufficient lighting and lane/trail visibility along some paths and trails. Specifically mentioned were the Westside Blueway Trails, Brentwood Park due to large presence of youth and seniors, and 27th Avenue. Reflectors were mentioned as a low cost way of improving visibility along rails or barriers next to paths and trails.

Solar lights were also mentioned as a low-cost solution for improving visibility along the paths and trails.

## Litter along Westside Blueway Trails

Member mentioned that the Westside Blueway Trails are often littered and could benefit from more increased maintenance.

### Scared to ride bike within the City

Two members of the Committee expressed feeling "scared" to ride their bike in the City's streets, and mentioned that they either go to other cities ("Weston, Pembroke Pines") to ride bike or only bike at parks.
